The Amir expressed the con-demnation of the Gov-ernment and people of Bahrain for the attack Bahrain for the attack which happened when gunmen sprayed bul-lets at President Mubarak's armoured limousine as he was being taken to an Organisation of Afri-can Unity (OAU)

President Mubarak expressed his thanks and gratitude for the Amir's call and for his concern. He wished the Amir good health and the people of Bahrain fur-
