## Top Indian institute to set up base in Bahrain

A MAJOR Indian educational institution plans to establish its first overseas operations in Bahrain by January next year.

The institution will cater to all residents in the Gulf region, said J B Saksena, officer on special duty at the Birla Institute of Technology (BIT) based in Ranchi, India.

Mr Saksena said that there was immense potential to establish such a presence in Bahrain.

"Bahrain's status as an international centre for trade, commerce and finance has seen the establishment of several international organisations in the country," he said.

"The current drive of the Government to consolidate its position as the regional centre for training and human resources development is underlined by its helpful attitude and incentives.

"Encouraged by such a trend, BIT is proposing to set up an institute to offer a series of

Mr Saksena was speaking shortly before he left Bahrain, after extensive discussions with Labour and Social Affairs Minister Abdulnabi Al Sho'ala, other officals at the Ministry and executives at Mohammed Jalal and Sons, which is likely to be involved with the project.

These include all disciplines in engineering, electronics, pharmacology, management and even such highly specialised courses in Rocket Engineering, reportedly the only institution in India to offer such a course.

Mr Saksena said that BIT was likely to begin operations in Bahrain from January next year.

He is expected to return to Bahrain in September along with BIT Vice-Chancellor Emeritable P Pande to sign a memorandum of understanding with the Labour and Social Affairs Ministry and Mohammed Jalal and Sons, which has shown interest in a joint venture.

The proposed institute in Bahrain will also offer at the next phase, training programmes in a number of vocations.

Mr Saksena said a study was being undertaken to determine the areas, he said.

Mr Al Sho'ala said authorities were delighted that a prestigious institution from India was in the process of selecting Bahrain as its regional base to cater to the growing needs of education, training and human development resources in the region.

"I am sure the initiative taken by BIT will be suitably rewarded both in terms of response and commercial viability," he said.

"Bahrain welcomes international institutions of proven track record to take advantage of the enormous market potential."

Mr Al Sho' ala said the Ministry had launched an aggressive marketing campaign in this connection and several educational institutions, training institutes and others conected with the sector in Europe, US, the Middle East, the Far East, Australia, New Zealand and the Indian sub-continent have shown interest.
